Festive Recycling

With the vast amounts of packaging etc associated with Christmas and New Year festivities we'd like to remind residents of what can be recycled by Chorley Council and which of your bins they should go in.

Blue Bin

Plastic bottles, pots, tubs and food trays, plant pots

Glass bottles and containers wine, beer, and condiment bottles and jars (including lids)

Steel and aluminium tins and cans, empty aerosol cans, clean foil food trays and kitchen foil

Green Bin

Food waste, pet waste, wipes, tissues, polystyrene packaging, disposable nappies

Any other non-recyclable or non reusable items.

NO items that should go in your recycling bins.

Eelectrical items and batteries, hazardous waste (asbestos, car batteries and oil, DIY items (builders waste and rubble, treated wood, household or garden chemicals must be taken to the recycling centre

Brown Bin

Paper newspapers, supplements and magazines, brochures, catalogues, phone books, leaflets, envelopes (including window envelopes, gift wrap, brown and white paper). If you can scrunch paper and it doesn't spring back, it can be recycled.

Cardboard boxes and corrugated cardboard (remove **all** plastic inserts, polystyrene and packing tape, greetings cards without glitter (tear off the glitter section as well as any badges and batteries)

Grey Bin

Grass, leaves, flowers and plants (with the soil removed) weeds, twigs and small branches, windfall fruit, houseplants, flower cuttings, real Christmas trees (chopped up), hay/straw (soiled animal bedding from non-meat eating animals only), vegetable waste from the garden only (e.g. potato tops (not kitchen waste)

Croston Station

If you see any sign of vandalism on Croston (or any other) Station please text the information to 61016.

Add the number to your contacts under British Transport Police.

Even if it is only youths acting intimidating, please report it.

Also, if you have any problems with the ticket machine, or trains being cancelled, please report it to Northern Rail,

and if it's not too much trouble, please let Friends of Croston Station know on 07904 118361.



Government Energy Schemes

There are several schemes available to help vulnerable and low-income homes pay their energy bills over winter.

Warm Home Discount - a one-time payment of £150 that is taken off energy bills between October and April if your energy provider participates in the scheme. You may need to apply through your energy provider to receive this discount.

Cold weather payment - a one-off payment of $\pounds 25$ when temperatures in your area are 0°C or below for seven days or more, depending on whether or not you receive certain benefits.

Winter Fuel Payment - a payment of between £250 - £600 to help pay heating bills, for people born on or before the 26 September 1956.


Tots Group

Take Care at Christmas

As always, at this time of year, opportunist thieves are on the lookout.

Please keep presents hidden and away from view (both in your car when Christmas shopping or your homes over Christmas).

Do not advertise on social media that you are doing Christmas shopping or that your house is empty as you are 'checked in' to another location.

Make things as difficult as possible for burglars. Keep doors and windows locked, and this includes sheds and garages. Remove all tools from works vehicles overnight if possible and never leave any valuables on show in your car.

Have you had your say on Lancashire's roads?

Lancashire County Council is asking for residents' views on Lancashire's highways and transport services - from the condition of roads and footpaths to the quality of cycling facilities.

The council's highways team are encouraging people to complete



the National Highways and Transport (NHT) survey, which measures public satisfaction with services across different local authorities. You can have your say on your roads and transport locally by completing the short survey.

The results will be compared with the views of other members of the public across 111 local authorities in England and Scotland. It will help the county council make future decisions on where to prioritise their resources, share best practice and identify further opportunities to work with other authorities in the future.

This year, the council have made marked improvements to reduce the impact of their work on the environment and are set to achieve a 15% carbon saving in our carriageway capital programme. They recently received a national award in recognition of their Highways Decarbonisation Strategy, which includes the use new lower carbon materials and techniques for road maintenance.

Use three random word passwords and set up 2-step verification for email,

Check before buying

Research online retailers to check they're legitimate. Check out online reviews.

Report suspicious activity
