A message from our Chair

Spring Greetings Everyone,

Spring has arrived in Croston and it's wonderful to be enjoying longer daylight and warmer weather as we head towards Easter 2024.

Tributes: The Parish Council (P.C.) was most saddened to hear that a previous P.C. Clerk, Margaret Duff & a Chair & Councillor Margaret Iddon, as well as a much valued parish volunteer Richard Foulger had all passed. You can read tributes to these lovely parishioners on the dedicated pages. Our condolences go out to all their families.

Financial Efficiency, Accountability : The P.C. is focused on spending the precept as efficiently as possible. In line with the National Association of Local Councils' guidance for a parish our size, the P.C. adopted the recommended number of contracted hours when appointing the new clerk, Paul Cafferkey. His wealth of accounting and local government experience is proving invaluable in guiding Cllrs with financial planning, expenditure and saving efficiencies. In addition, he has set up a new online banking system which has increased transparency, requiring oversight by three nominated Cllrs to ensure full accountability of transactions. Our Lengthsman (L.M.) of 35 years, who litter picks and now carries out additional tasks around the village, recently requested a significant reduction in hours, which the Council unanimously agreed. He now carries out 6 hours per week. There is ongoing collaboration between the L.M., Chair and Clerk to ensure a rolling programme of litter picking throughout the main areas of the village. We encourage residents to contact the Clerk if they notice any areas that we may have overlooked. As a result of these changes, we have increased efficiency and considerably reduced our staffing costs which are now in line with those of other similar local parish councils

Precept to Help Fund Renovations: The P.C. owns and is responsible for the upkeep of The Green, The Recreation Park and The War Memorial, as well as maintaining Out Lane Car Park which we lease. This all comes at considerable cost from the Precept and other funding. We are extremely grateful for the voluntary work done by Croston in Bloom, Croston Together and other community groups in helping look after these areas which certainly helps reduce costs. However, the P.C. still has to find a significant % from the Precept for ongoing upkeep eg grass cutting, of these much loved village amenities. In addition to day to day costs, we have recognised that some parts of P.C. areas are in a such a poor state of repair that they now require additional funding for comprehensive renovation e.g. repainting rusting chains and bollards, regrouting flags, power washing paths, etc... Some items such as the Council Noticeboards require complete replacement. A recent Inspection Report on the Recreation Ground has identified historic damage that must be addressed and funded from Precept . The P.C. will apply for some external funding for 'Project Renovation 2024' but will have to find some of the cost of the renovations from increases to the precept.

The P.C. voted unanimously to implement a reasonable increase in the Parish Precept 2024 -2025 to help cover the renovations needed and, on advice, to build up a safety net of Financial Reserves for any contingency measures required in the future e.g. repairs to playground equipment. The exact amount of precept payable will vary dependent on the Council Tax Band of your individual property e.g. a Band **D** property will pay an additional £8.51 for the year compared with last year's precept. We sincerely hope you share our decision that a modest increase in the Parish Precept as outlined, is worthwhile to invest in much needed renovation work. The P.C. is committed to improvements to parish infrastructure. **Thank you in anticipation of your support for improvements.**

Liaising with Chorley Council (C.C.) : We are trying to establish how C.C. owned garages by the side of Peartree Rd., Croston which were sold without P.C. knowledge. Also we are having ongoing dialogue about the poor condition of the remaining four garages that C.C. still own and rent out. We are trying to get these renovated and available to parishioners. We are also liaising with C.C. about possible replacement of plastic bollards around some verges with more substantial metal ones, to better protect pedestrians and reduce damage to the grass verges in those areas.

Primary School Pre-Nursery Passed: The P.C. supported the recent application by the primary school to build a preschool nursery, which we are delighted to see has been passed by Chorley Council.

PROW and Funding Received: We have received some funds ringfenced for improvements to Public Rights of Way in Croston. FYI, the P.C. is aware of the damage to the L.C.C. owned footbridge behind the Old School and is liaising with LCC on this PROW. We are also applying for funds from Lancs Environmental Fund to assist with improvements to benches along PROW.

Grants and Donations: The P.C. has supported the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal, CVFG towards the cost of the Christmas Fair 2023 and Ulnes Walton Third Prison Action Group into looking at the effects of this on traffic in the local area including Croston. In addition, we bought new P.C. owned lights for the trees on The Green last December.



Last but certainly not least, Cllrs were delighted to be invited into **Trinity St. Michael's School** to do a workshop **"All About The Parish Council"** with these wonderful School Cllrs who will hopefully be our Parish Councillors of the future! Croston P.C. would be in good hands with them in charge.

Margaret Duff was Clerk to the Parish Council for 25 years from 1977 and her involvement in our community showcased a life well-lived and committed to the betterment of the lives of others. Margaret and her husband David moved into the village from Keswick in 1976 and quickly endeared themselves to Crostoners through their active involvement in the community. David

was Chair to the Parish Council 1981-83 & also Chair of the Sub-Committee formed to oversee the purchase of land on the corner of Out Lane which was to become our Village Green. According to her son Chris, his mum "was good at getting the best out of people using a carrot not the stick approach!"

It's evident that Margaret's positive influence extended well beyond her professional life in Croston, as seen by her significant contribution to voluntary work for The Royal Air Forces Association (RAFA). As recognition for this, in 2014 she received 'the British Empire Medal,' conferred by HRH Queen Elizabeth II, testament to Margaret's outstanding input to RAFA. Following this award, Margaret attended a Royal Garden Party at Buckingham Palace later that year, reflecting the esteem in which she was held.



Margaret Iddon (Left photo, front right; right photo, middle right) was Chair of the Parish Council in the 1990's. Current Cllr **Kath Almond** writes: Margaret Iddon and I were in the same class at school. She went on to work at Lloyds Bank in Preston, a job which she loved. She took an interest in the village, and in the 1980's was elected to stand for the Parish Council, subsequently becoming Chair. I think she may have decided to step down from the Parish Council when she began writing her book on the village called **'Memories of Croston in Times Past'**. The Highway Code: re you aware of the latest updates?

Modern vehicles travelling too quickly on the narrow roads of Croston village, can create quite dangerous issues at times. The following amendments to The Highway Code came into effect only a couple of years ago. They including a hierarchy of road users designed to create **'clearer and stronger priorities' for pedestrians**, and updated rules for overtaking. The Department of Transport claims that the modifications, largely categorised under three rules, aim to improve safety for pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders.

Rule H1: New hierarchy of road users

Drivers of vehicles that can cause the greatest harm in the event of a collision eg large farm vehicles, bear the **greatest responsibility** to take care and reduce the danger to others. This principle applies most strongly to drivers of HGVs, LGVs, cars/taxis and motorcycles. Cyclists and horse riders likewise have a responsibility to reduce danger to pedestrians.

Rule H2: New priority for pedestrians at junctions

At a junction, drivers, motorcyclists, horse riders and cyclists should **give way to pedestrians** crossing or waiting to cross a road into which or from which you are turning. You should give way to pedestrians waiting to cross a zebra crossing (currently you only have to give way if they're already on the crossing), and to pedestrians and cyclists waiting to cross a parallel crossing.

Rule H3: New priority for cyclists when cars are turning

You should not cut across cyclists, horse riders or horse drawn vehicles going ahead when you are turning into or out of a junction or changing direction or lane. This applies whether they are using a cycle lane, a cycle track or riding ahead on the road and you should give way to them. Do not turn at a junction if to do so would cause the cyclist, horse rider or horse drawn vehicle going straight ahead to stop or swerve. You should stop and wait for a safe gap in the flow of cyclists if necessary.

Other key amendments include clearer guidance for drivers to leave a distance of at least **1.5 metres when overtaking cyclists.** Drivers are also encouraged to reduce the risk of an accident by opening their door by using the hand on the opposite side, as it is more likely to lead to them looking over their shoulder. For more detailed rules **The Highway Code: 8 changes you need to know from 29.1.22 GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)**

Hitting a pedestrian at 40mph there is a 90 % chance they will be killed. At 35 mph there is a 50 % chance they will be killed. At 30 mph there is a 20 % chance they will be killed. At 20 mph there is a 2.5 % chance they will be killed. **The speed limit through the village is 20 mph.** Driving 0.5 miles at 20 mph will take 1 minute 30 seconds Driving 0.5 miles at 30 mph will take 1 minute ...

Drivers : Surely a person's life is worth 30 seconds of your time?
